
Help students create their own poetry using some of the poems as a model

23-24 POL Judge's Guide

The [2023-24 POL Judge's Guide](#) is now available. Read this guide to understand what the judges will look for in your students' recitations.

Here are the changes made this year (these are also reflected in the teacher's guide):

- Clarification that mispronunciations **are not** accuracy errors.
- Name change of the criterion "Dramatic Appropriateness" to "Interpretation." This category remains the same in its description; however, we made the name change to this criterion based on feedback from the POL community and also to align ourselves with our international recitation contest counterparts who also name this category "Interpretation." We also feel this change more accurately describes the criterion and what the judges should be considering.
